For this reason, the next cycle, which begins in 2019 and ends in 2022, will present major challenges for our organization. Starting in 2019, we will begin to transform our city, our state, and our country.

LETTER FROM THE FOUNDERS

To those who work within Brazilian society, 2018 was an atypical year.

IT IS COMMON FOR presidential elections to be marked by accentuated political agitation, given the importance they have within democratic societies. However, last year brought new elements of analysis for those who study behavior in communities. In 33 years of redemocratization, there has never been such turmoil within the population.

The 2018 election cycle said more about the Brazilian population than it did about the candidates themselves. Members of society were the ones who broke family ties, who showed themselves as intolerant, who reproduced violence. Society initiated a political fight that failed to respect a norm of peaceful coexistence.

The upheaval of 2018 reinforces the idea that politics in Brazil is a product of Brazilian democratic culture. We cannot blame the State for democratic erosions without first examining our society, our social interactions, and our cultural dynamics.

For this reason, Instituto Atuação directs its strategy and its actions at improving democratic culture. If society is the space from which the fundamentals of our politics emerge, then

society is where we must begin in order to seek structural transformation.

The past year was crucial for such a purpose. We launched our report of the first trial of the Local Democracy Index, in Curitiba. This report was the culmination of 900 surveys in the public and in-depth interviews with local experts. In addition to illustrating the existing deficit in democratic culture in our society on a numeric scale, the Local Democracy Index brought our attention to a disdain for democracy exhibited by a significant portion of respondents through indicators such as low levels of interpersonal and institutional trust, little disposition for associativism, and a general lack of knowledge concerning citizens' rights and duties.

Moreover, 2018 was the year to channel the Index's definition of a democratic society into a Theory of Change. Only a systemic approach makes it possible to understand the key forces needed for societal development. Values such as focus on the human being, freedom, solidarity, and honesty translate themselves into the political language of tolerance, civic engagement, appreciation for community and social capital.

Instituto Atuação's cycle of introspection, of planning and of theoretical consolidation ends with 2018. Metaphorically, the roots of our "Chinese Bamboo Tree" have finally fixed themselves in the soil, with the consistent establishment of our vision and values, with the launch of the innovative tool which is the Local Democracy Index, and with the development of a scientific systematization of democratic culture. In 2019, the metaphor of the "Chinese Bamboo Tree" will continue in the appearance of the stem on the ground: a stem which will bring the practical implementation of *Cidade Modelo*, the program for the transformation of the political life of our city, our state and our country.


WHY DEMOCRATIC CULTURE?

To speak of democratic culture, today, is a great challenge for two reasons:

FIRST, CULTURE is a concept which, having a multitude of meanings, has been emptied of substance. Culture can refer to the cultivation of the land, can be associated with the idea of civilization, can be considered as a criterion of social distinction, can indicate a penchant for artistic activities. "Culture" has had varying semantic uses throughout history as different intellectual traditions borrowed the term for their own purposes. In political discourse, one sees a plethora of applications of the term dividing scholars and inhibiting an exploration of the subject. However, this phenomenon does not eliminate the possibility of finding a unifying definition that precedes the different existing conceptions of culture. We at Atuação have come to see culture as the orientations that structure¹ people's ways of feeling, thinking and acting² in society. Culture is the responsible entity for the good functioning, cohesion, order in social life³, and shared sense of interaction among individuals4.

THE SECOND CHALLENGE in speaking of democratic culture concerns its inextricability with democracy, a concept that once held a more prominent position in global politics. As democracy is the regime-type most conducive to the sustainable development of society, respect for human dignity, and guarantee of civil liberties, the recent weakening of democratic regimes in the world is concerning: more than 27 democracies have collapsed since the 2000s⁵. Recent examples include Venezuela, Turkey and Thailand, and this scenario gets even more worrisome when data suggests that in recent years the number of countries whose citizens have had many of their political and civil rights taken away has surpassed the number of countries that have made progress in their liberties. Countries that once had a strong and consolidated democracy, such as the United States, Japan, Austria, France and the Netherlands, show signs of weakening.

Contrary to what is commonly imagined, most democratic collapses had their roots in abuses of power and disrespect for constitutional rules on the part of a democratically-elected regime, rather than in military coups. In other words, democracies die because societies themselves endorse the decline of democratic governance.

That is why it has never been so important to unite culture and democracy in the same expression. Democratic culture is crucial to meeting the challenges societies face in the 21st century. Democratic culture, as the orientations that structure people's ways of feeling, thinking, and acting in truly democratic societies, is the antidote to authoritarianism. Democratic culture is an effective remedy for the collapse of democracy, as culturally democratic individuals do not endorse corruption, do not accept the vi-

olation of the rule of law, and do not tolerate social injustice.

This worldview of politics means understanding that the rule of law, proper functioning of the government, electoral process, and civil rights are ultimately guaranteed only when demanded by society itself. The responsibility of maintaining democracy rests on individuals, on citizens. For this, democratic culture is needed. It is necessary for people to be genuinely guided by the democratic principles of focus on the human being, freedom, solidarity, orientation towards the common good, and acknowledgment of individual responsibility. It is in the absence of these guidelines that society is led by political intolerance, polarization, and hatred, as observed in the 2018 elections of a number of countries. including our own.

That said, the mere act of speaking of democratic culture in our country means advocating for its development. It is precisely because of the lack of democratic culture that, according to The Economist Intelligence Unit's Democracy Index⁷, Brazil still qualifies as a flawed, and not a full, democracy.

In the city of Curitiba, the implementation in 2017 of Instituto Atuação's Local Democracy

Index corroborates this perspective about our insufficiency of democratic culture.



Atuação's **Local Democracy Index**, in the city of Curitiba, in 2018.


Perception of the importance to live in a democracy

How can we ensure the proper functioning of politics if our society does not deliver the values and knowledge needed to sustain a democratic regime? We need citizens who see their own capacity to herald transformation, apply democratic values at home, and believe in democracy as the ethos of human relations at

the community. We need this for democracy to flourish and for society to develop. We need citizens with democratic culture.



DELCIO MANUEL: attending Global and International Studies at Carleton University. Delcio developed research related to Psychology, Totemism and Social Belonging.

Our work is composed of four main categories, which complement each other: **Diagnosis, Research, Implementation** and **Awareness**.




DIAGNOSIS

The first step in transforming reality is to diagnose the situation. The beginning of our operation, therefore, is the measurement of the quality of democracy at the local level through the **Local Democracy Index**.

The Local Democracy Index is a novel tool, developed from a joint effort of Instituto Atuação, its Research Committee, and major global experts on the subject, from institutes such as The Economist Intelligence Unit, Freedom House and Latinobarómetro

The tool assesses local democracy in five categories: (1) civil rights and liberties; (2) functioning of the local government; (3) electoral process and pluralism; (4) political participation; and (5) democratic culture

In 2018, we published the report about the 2017 execution of the Local Democracy Index in Curitiba. To evaluate democracy, 900 members of the population were surveyed, in-depth interviews were conducted with experts on the subject, and the evaluations of secondary data



were completed. The final score reached by Curitiba was 49.5%.

The Index showed that Curitiba is challenged by a lack of political participation and democratic culture. When the foundations of democratic culture are insufficient, there are no guarantees for the sustainability of institutions, liberties and democratic rights over the long term, which is why Instituto Atuação's mission to address the root of the problem - democratic culture - is so important.





How safe do you feel concerning criminals in your neighborhood?




Comparison among candidates and proposals

Although the diagnosis of democracy in Curitiba was published in 2018, this does not mean that its operation has finished. Our diagnostic effort continues with two lines of work.

On one hand, the Local Democracy Index will continue to be applied in the city of Curitiba to periodically monitor the impacts of our projects on the population. This will enable strategic reviews, evaluation of hypotheses, and synthesis of lessons learned to improve the proposed model.

On the other hand, after launching the Local Democracy Index, we have had interest in the replicability of the tool in other cities. In 2019, we will work toward its improvement, so that our process can be replicated in other cities in Brazil and abroad.

The Local Democracy Index is a very promising tool that can trigger critical discussions and analyses of democracy and democratic culture. We hope that, by 2019, we can begin the first tests of its replication in other cities.




RESEARCH

Once diagnosis is finished, the second stage of our operation consists on research. The Research Department is, for the most part, responsible for this stage of our operation. Its work consists of: (1) engaging in extensive research in several academic disciplines in order to discover the levers of transformation of democratic culture; (2) maintaining constant communication with key researchers in Brazil and abroad to confirm proposed theories; (3) analyzing case studies of practical actions already validated elsewhere in the world; (4) conducting measurement and analysis of data generated by the practical tests of theories (from projects of our Implementation Department); and (5) reviewing new suggestions for concrete ways to improve society.



Since 2018, we have focused our attention on the creation and constant improvement of a systemic understanding of democratic culture. Through research and the elaboration of hypotheses to be tested empirically, we have discovered ways to make our culture truly democratic.

The Theory of Change, the main research undertaking of 2018, was essential to determine what model of democratic culture is desirable and feasible. It also helped elucidate how we can promote democratic culture in our society through practical action. The process was a global enterprise, including great professors and researchers from around the world. The purpose was to consult the varied perspectives of specialists, who offered a global perspective of the components and variables of a democratic culture.



The Theory of Change was divided in two phases: (1) Definition of indispensable values for the actualization of democratic culture; and (2) Initial systemic understanding of how democratic culture operates and what its main influence factors are, with the help of specialists and international researchers.

The construction of the Theory of Change included consultations with more than ten national and international university professors and specialists, in diverse areas of social scientific knowledge. We held meetings with sociologists,

anthropologists, political scientists, philosophers, psychologists, lawyers, journalists and education professionals, linked to universities such as Stanford University, Case Western Reserve University, University of Gothenburg, McGill University, Universidade Federal do Paraná, Universidade Tecnológica Federal do Paraná, Pontifícia Universidade Católica do Paraná, Universidade Federal do Rio Grande do Sul, Pontifícia Universidade Católica do Rio Grande do Sul, Fundação Getúlio Vargas, Universidade Estadual do Rio Grande do Norte, among others. We also held workshops to discuss politics and culture with research advisers, such as Prof. Bernardo Brandão (Universidade Federal do Paraná) and Dr. Guilherme Cunha Pereira, as well as with partners, such as Renan Barbosa, editor of the newspaper Gazeta do Povo.

In 2019, the Research Department will release studies describing the reality of Curitiba and suggestions for the implementation of projects to benefit democratic culture based upon the Theory of Change. The Research Department will continue to be responsible for monitoring and evaluating the results of the implementation, in order to be able to evaluate, improve and, eventually, scale our theory to the national level.

IMPLEMENTATION

The Implementation Department is responsible for putting theory into practice and generating concrete change. Currently, our main program is Cidade Modelo, which aims to make Curitiba a laboratory of innovation to strengthen democratic culture. Using the recognized Collective Impact methodology, developed by FSG Consulting, in 2019, we will work with multisector committees of leaders to work towards a Common Agenda, developing projects that will be implemented in the city to foster democratic culture. In 2018, the Implementation Department worked on two projects: Infrastructure and the planning of Cidade Modelo itself.

Infrastructure

The infrastructure project was a necessary prerequisite for Cidade Modelo's 2019 work because it developed a plan to harness Collective Impact methodology.

Collective Impact is a methodology, created by the renowned Mark Kramer and Michael Porter of FSG Consulting. It arises from the premise that complex and systemic social problems cannot be solved from isolated and punctual actions of a few individuals or sectors. For a project to make a true structural impact, it is necessary for a number of multisector actors (business, government and civil society) to come together under a Common Agenda to solve the problem in question.

The methodology of Collective Impact proved to be the most appropriate to be applied in Brazil, given our desire for structural transformation. The Infrastructure project made Instituto Atuação a pioneer in bringing this methodology to Brazil and developed its role as the support

The main premises of the Collective Impact methodology are:


- multisectoral commitment around a transformative, collectively built Common Agenda;
- continuous communication among all involved people, for constant alignment and learning;
- practical actions that are reinforced among actors regarding what is already being done and always seeking synergies among the specialties of those involved;
- establishment of goals and the measurement of results in a collaborative way; and
- importance of an organization that provides support for the working groups, ensuring collaboration of all stakeholders, compliance with the Common Agenda, achievement of established goals, and control of generated results.

organization through the implementation of *Cidade Modelo*. The Infrastructure project also mapped the social actors in Curitiba. In 2018, a total of thirty interviews were conducted with some of the main leaderships in the city, in order to understand their ways of acting and of influencing society. Based upon such mapping, we will start engaging several partners to build the Common Agenda and the strategy of *Cidade Modelo*.






Structure for Collective Impact



Cidade Modelo

In 2019, Curitiba will become the first Brazilian laboratory of democratic culture. As Instituto Atuação's main program, *Cidade Modelo* will remain supported by the diagnostic activities of the Local Democracy Index, the systemic approach to the Theory of Change project, and the methodological structure designed by the Infrastructure project.



Fundamentally, *Cidade Modelo* is a program of global interest. Built to serve as a laboratory of democratic culture, the program has attracted the attention of our global partners, academia, and research institutes. This is because causal relations between relevant variables will be found empirically in the local context, and universal conclusions will also be drawn on the themes of democracy and democratic culture. To this purpose, *Cidade Modelo* is structured as follows aside.

The next step of *Cidade Modelo* will include engagement with its first partners. Initially planned for the end of 2018, engagement with partners was postponed to the beginning of 2019 to accommodate further refinement of the Theory of Change. This buffer period allowed us to develop a more comprehensive Theory of Change, which will guide *Cidade Modelo*. With this necessary adjustment in the timeline of the program, *Cidade Modelo* is now ready to officially begin work in the city of Curitiba.

Doubtlessly, the next few years will bring great challenges for *Cidade Modelo*. In 2019, we plan

The *Cidade Modelo* is structured in the following way:

- in-depth evaluation of democratic culture in Curitiba (based on the premises provided by the Theory of Change and by the diagnostic activities);
- formation of a new legitimate and effective governance mechanism, capable of implementing systemic solutions in the city of Curitiba and based on multisectoral collaboration;
- implementation of tests from hypotheses, in order to bring systemic improvements; and
- 4. fine-tuning of solutions for the systemic transformation of democratic culture.

to create a collective endeavor for action in Curitiba. This process will culminate in the launching of the Common Agenda and in the mobilization of thematic working groups, composed of multisector actors designed to propose and implement action plans.

These plans have a double purpose:

- 1. to develop democratic culture in Curitiba; and
- 2. to serve as a platform for the testing of hypotheses presented by Instituto Atuação's Research Department.

Cidade Modelo positions itself as a strategic initiative. As it promotes tangible improvements in trust, associativism and political knowledge, it will simultaneously provide empirical data that will feed our understanding of how the elements of democratic culture function in practice.

In 2018, we hired a Marketing Director and began to develop an external relations strategy to raise awareness about democratic culture and disseminate our Research Department's ideas among the public and among community leaders.

Launch event of the Local Democracy Index

The Local Democracy Index report was officially launched in 2018 and was presented at an event on June 6 at the Oscar Niemeyer Museum in Curitiba. Investors, government representatives, and members of civil society who attended the event provided very positive feedback.

The evening performance was opened by the speech of Gabriel Raad, General Director of Laguna Construtora, who sponsored the event along with Renault Brazil. His speech highlighted the importance of democracy and the role that companies play in its promotion. We also had a presentation given by the political scientist Humberto Dantas, who explored the history of democracy in the 19th, 20th and 21st centuries, followed by the speech of our Research Manager Henrique Raskin communicating the main findings of the Local Democracy Index.

It was a great honor to have our investors and partners join us to celebrate this achievement.



Distribution of the 2nd Coletânea da Democracia

Another major focus of 2018 was the dissemination of knowledge through the sale and distribution of the 2nd *Coletânea da Democracia*.

In order to fulfill its mission of raising awareness and bringing highly relevant content to political debate in Brazil, Instituto Atuação translated works that are essential to the discourse about democracy into Portuguese.

Following the success of the 1st *Coletânea da Democracia*, the 2nd *Coletânea da Democracia* included issues of great importance to democracy in Brazil.

The 2nd *Coletânea da Democracia* was funded by the Federal Law for Cultural Incentive (Rouanet), allowing 455 free copies to be distributed to the public.

In 2018, we focused on distributing the 2nd Coletânea da Democracia to public universities. This way, we enable researchers to use these works to enrich the development of democratic theory in Brazil.

Among the universities that received *Coletâneas* in 2018 are *Universidade Federal do Pampa, Universidade Federal de Goiás, Universidade Federal de Juiz de Fora, Universidade Estadual*

Paulista (Campi Marília and São Paulo), Universidade Estadual de Londrina and Universidade Federal Fluminense (Campi Niterói, Macaé and Petrópolis).

Also, in 2018, four great partners of Instituto Atuação contributed to the circulation of the 2nd *Coletânea da Democracia* by allowing it to reach up to 280 political influencers in Brazil. Committed to the promotion of democracy,

Anoreg-PR (Associação dos Notários e Registradores do Paraná) distributed 70 Coletâneas to State Deputies elected in 2018. Votorantim, as part of its 100th anniversary celebration, sent Coletâneas to 100 journalists, institutes and digital influencers. In addition, BNP Paribas distributed another 60 units to clients, and our partner Marcelo Almeida delivered 50 collections to key people from public agencies. These actions

reinforce their respective commitments to Brazilian democracy.



Editora Atuação

Instituto Atuação has decided to place the creation of Editora Atuação, our publishing house, on hold to focus on the replicability of the Local Democracy Index and on generating media attention through our projects.

MEDIA IMPACT

Although the primary institutional focus of 2018 was not garnering media attention, Instituto Atuação received much exposure.

WE COVERED ISSUES related to democratic culture in the main media in Curitiba and Brazil by focusing on results generated by the Local Democracy Index or content from our Research Department.

Throughout the year, we had more than 35 articles and interviews on the Local Democracy Index in print, online, television and radio networks. Our work reverberated in channels such as Gazeta do Povo, RPC, CBN, BandNews, O Estado de S. Paulo, Programa Terceira Via, Red Innovacion, among others. Based on data from Gazeta do Povo, O Estado de S. Paulo, and RPC, we received an estimated USD 33,732.48 (USD 1 = BRL 3.84) of free media coverage.

The Local Democracy Index special, developed by *Gazeta do Povo*, is a highlight of this coverage. In addition to making an interactive infographic with the Local Democracy Index's findings, *Gazeta do Povo* produced a series of news articles on topics related to democratic culture, such as interpersonal trust, subsidiarity and political knowledge.






Financial comparisons: 2014 to 2018 - (USD 1 = BRL 3.84)




Sources of revenue in 2018 - [USD 1 = BRL 3.84]

2019 BRINGS a new movement, that of stem growth, which offers with it the implementation and the impact of the ideas we've been developing for years. Starting in 2019, we will begin to transform our city, our state, and our country.

The next cycle, which begins in 2019 and ends in 2022, will present major challenges for our organization, whether in the diagnosis, research, implementation or awareness stage.

As the Local Democracy Index is replicated in different cities, it will take on a major role in other regions of Brazil. As discussed, the diagnosis stage is central to the dissemination of the democratic culture so deficient in our country. As many of our donors have commented: "numbers shock, but do not surprise". If we want to transform the country, we must continue to export our ideas and work to other cities.

Instituto Atuação's Research Department will continue to build knowledge and understanding of democratic culture. In 2019, early data emerging from the Theory of Change will absorb much of our researchers' efforts. They will

in turn guide the actions of *Cidade Modelo*. The Research Department will be responsible for validating and improving its own categories of analysis in order to build a model for democratic culture in Brazil.

Cidade Modelo, the main program of Instituto Atuação, will also play a large role in the next cycle. As early as 2019, we will see the establishment and the institutionalization of the Common Agenda, which will mobilize thematic working groups for action in the short term in Curitiba. Therefore, 2019 will be a year of implementation, action, transformation. It will embrace the pioneering initiative of applying the methodology of collective impact on Brazilian soil.

Along with all of this, one of the main focuses of Instituto Atuação for the coming years will be the development of relationships with the main opinion makers in the country, in order to create a common understanding on democratic culture and to establish it as an important part of political discourse. Thus, awareness raising will continue to play an important role in the Institute's marketing and public relations strategy.

As such, we have established strategic objectives in 2018 that will integrate our operation and guide our activity in the 2019-2022 cycle. We seek to showcase our team as a microcosm of democratic culture and excellence; to present Instituto Atuação as reference in political culture; to convince opinion makers of the priority of improving democratic culture in Brazil; to build a global, systemic understanding of democratic culture to be tested and measured; and to achieve financial sustainability through the intelligent allocation of our financial resources.



2019 will be a year of implementation, action, transformation.

The year 2018 concluded by preparing us for a new challenging cycle that will surely be permeated by hard work. However, nothing stimulates us as much as championing democratic culture. As previously said, there is no simple and easy way to solve the complex and difficult problems our society faces. Therefore, it is necessary to roll up our sleeves and get to work.
